Mark 9:34

"But they kept silent, for on the way they had argued with one another about who was the greatest."

One thing I love about Scripture is that God doesn't sanitize the image of his followers. Bible heroes like Abraham, David, Paul, and others have their sinful natures exposed. And in today's reading, the disciples are seen arrogantly arguing about who is the greatest. Since God loved and forgave all these and still used them in service to Him, I can trust that He won't turn away from me even when my sinful pride is exposed.

Pride causes conflict and gets in the way of reconciliation. We can see this so clearly as we read in 1 Samuel the growing conflict Saul has with David. Pride, and fear of losing his own status, drives Saul to horrible extremes. I know too, when my heart is clouded by pride, I can't see clearly – no matter how wise I believe I am at the time. Pride keeps me from recognizing how I hurt others. Instead, I focus on how much greater my hurt is than yours. My pride and pain stop me from taking the log out of my eye. I don't forgive because I only see my pain. It's all about ME.

In contrast, Jesus came in humility to serve me. He lowered Himself to take on my sins, including my pride. He suffered and died for my sake, setting aside His glory for my shame. He put my needs ahead of His own. *"For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many"* (Mark 10:45).



The one who serve me calls me to servanthood. Because of His love, I can look beyond my own pain and seek to heal others in forgiveness.

Where might forgiveness and reconciliation be helpful for you? Where are you finding conflict arise, and your pride and personal justification growing? Where you begin to see it – give it to the LORD! God forgives you in Christ! Since you are forgiven, God gives you new eyes to see not your hurt, but the pain of others.

How might you live in Jesus in the conflict?

If you are reading 1 Samuel, you can see how David responds often to Saul. The Lord be with you, and send us that same Spirit. Pastor Hivs

- ⇒ No one is "put on the spot" (except the pastor and he is ok with that);
- ⇒ Questions are welcomed and there are no dumb questions (there's a likelihood that someone else is wondering too so be a friend and ask it for them, too).

The Discipline of Going to Church

Going to church can become routine. I know it, because I grew up going to every Sunday, even when on vacation, and Wednesdays during Advent and Lent. (disclaimer: My father was a pastor. But neither he or my mother went to church simply because he was a pastor.) My brother and I never had to ask, "Are we going to church today?" It was not a choice my parents gave me. It was something we did. It was of our regular routine even when we were on vacation!

Don't get me wrong. I know full well the dangers of making worship overly routine. I have experienced l stretches of dryness where I was "going through the motions". This can be dangerous to spiritual health. Traditionalism can become legalism. We can be satisfied with doing outwardly what we are supposed to do while avoiding spiritual introspection and growth.

Perhaps you have heard it said, "you shouldn't just go to church to go to church." But I invite you to reconsider the discipline of merely going to church. The discipline of going to church every week is in itself an act of worship, of sacrifice. You're saying to yourself and to the world that assembling with the people of God, that the story of Christianity, the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus matters so much that you're willing to build the pattern of your life around it.

I'm thankful that my father and mother made us go to church every week, and it didn't end at confirmation. Faithfulness to Christ means faithfulness as a member of the local body of Christ – no "me and Jesus alone are just fine." By going to church every week we present our bodies as a "living sacrifice" by getting up, dressing up, and going to church. When Christians practice weekly worship, it is a witness to others -- we "vote" to make our appointment with God (and His family) a priority by committing ourselves to church.

Every week a pastor wonders who will show up. There are those who consider church a nice and viable option on Sunday and there are those who consider it a priority. I I have doubts about those who say they "enjoy church once and a while." I feel sorrow for I those who boast that they can be Christians without going to church.

To be sure, faithful attendance is not all there is. We come to worship God *"in spirit and in truth"*. We come to be served by the Lord himself as we hear the Word of God and receive His gifts in the Lord's Supper. We come to encourage and serve our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ. It is the very discipline of going to church that sets the stage for those things to happen, for God to work powerfully in our hearts.

You see, going to church is not about "obeying rules and regulations." It is about "relationships" with the Lord and his people. Spiritual disciplines (such as attending church with fellow believers) bring us closer to Christ, whose power can change us.

Should you go to church when you don't want to? Yes! Why? You will build into your life a habit, a discipline that puts you in the place where God works, in the midst of His church. On those days, who knows, but that you may hear a life-changing message you otherwise would have missed!

So, it's a good idea to make a commitment to be in church every week. You'll be surprised at how this discipline will be a benefit to your life.

The Ark Encounter and The Creation Museum

Recently we went on a tour to visit Noah's Ark and the Creation Museum located in Kentucky. Earl and I wanted to share our joy in seeing these two places earlier this summer and to invite you to consider travelling there if you are looking for a great place to visit!!

The Ark Encounter is a one-of-a-kind, historically-themed attraction. It is entertaining, educational, and immersive way to view historical events centered on Noah's Ark as recorded

in the Bible. The Ark is an authentic and accurate 510-foot long, 85foot wide engineering marvel built according to the dimensions given in the Bible. It is situated in beautiful Grant County in Williamstown, Kentucky, halfway between Cincinnati and Lexington right off I-75. It is the largest timber-frame structure in the world.



On this massive 51-foot high Ark, you will tour three decks filled with scores of world-class exhibit bays that will allow you to experience what Noah's life may have been like. I think my biggest surprise was the liv-

ing quarters for Noah's entire family were really quite comfortable. There was even a total herbal kitchen and they grew their own garden vegetables on board - using compost waste from the animals. You'll learn how Noah might have cared for all the animals and the Ark was big enough to fit them all on board. It is an amazing discovery of how everything was stored, including food for the animals.

As our tour bus delivered us there, we walked to the Ark, and a huge burst of thunder and rain fell from the sky, literally! We were soaked when we entered. The greeter at the entrance said "how do you like our special effects?" I thought that was pretty clever. It really was an actual downfall, but looking ahead at the Ark, we knew we had a way out.

Just 45 miles away, is **the Creation Museum** located in Petersburg, KY. Do not miss this if you are in that area. More information can be found at ArkEncounter.com or CreationMuseum.org.

LCMS Stewardship Ministry Newsletter Article – September 2019

What is a steward? Most people will say a steward is a manager.

That is correct, but it is only half right. A steward is indeed a manager, but he is a manager of what does not belong to him. Someone else is the owner, and the steward manages the owner's property on the owner's behalf.

We are God's stewards. Our stewardship is that God has made us managers of what belongs to Him: "For we brought nothing into this world, and we cannot take anything out of the world" (1 Tim. 6:7)

Everything that we have and everything that we are comes from God's fatherly divine goodness and mercy. God is the owner.

This is not only because He created all things; He is also the Redeemer. He has redeemed – that is, purchased – and won all things. Therefore, it all belongs to Him.

We are simply managers of everything in this world. Like Joseph in Egypt, we are put in charge of managing what belongs to God. What a privilege.

Think about that for a minute. The all-knowing, all-powerful, all-wise God has asked us to manage his possessions on His behalf here on earth.

And by doing this, He invites us to take part in the allocation of His good gifts. He wants us to give our input and advise Him in where His gifts are to be used. What a privilege indeed.

But what a responsibility! "Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required" (Luke 12:48b).

We are not the owners. And while He puts us as managers, we are still to do with His property what He wants done with it. That means we need to know what He desires and wills for His property.

How do we know this? How can we know the will and mind of God?

We find the will of God in the Bible. There God tells us what His will is for all of His gifts. He tells us how we are to spend our time and use our talents and treasures. He instructs us in the use of our minds, bodies, and souls.

There is nothing we have that doesn't belong to Him.

"Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body" (1 Cor. 6:19–20).

God informs us of the big picture, the overarching policy, of how we as His stewards – managers and custodians – are to manage His property.

And that is stewardship. It is simply doing what God wants us to do with what He has given us.

As St. Paul said, "Do not present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness" (Rom. 6:13).

So, let's dive into God's Word, and listen to what He desires from His stewards.

The Singing Assembly

Worship and Music Notes

I've always liked the phrase "Dance like no one can see you" - and I suppose one could say the same about singing. The phrase implies a complete letting go of inhibition, with the fear of what it might sound or look like to others not a part of the mix. Would that all of us could be that way even when others can see and hear us! Watching a soloist let go, however, is fun - and many of us might even feel a bit of envy. Singing in worship is different – because we don't do it solo. When singing collectively we can let go so much more, and we do because we are not subject to judgment. This is what I love about congregational singing. Anyone can come and be a part of the assembly, singer and non-singer alike, sing out, and sing like "no one is watching or hearing." It's a huge release of energy, meaningfulness, and a complete "letting go." Here's something to consider about our singing: because have such a vast repertoire of hymnody, we may sing a new or unfamiliar hymn. Sometimes this involves being able to read music which is not an ability that everyone has. In these cases, it's the responsibility of those who read music to step up to the plate and help "a little more" - to carry those in the learning stages. For those of you who know this and accept the challenge to provide the help, on behalf of our assemblies and on behalf of those of us who plan what possibilities are for singing – thank you.

Have you considered the importance of singing to your well-being? Some would call it a mere activity - I would call it a human necessity. Babies must sing to get the lungs started outside the womb. Maybe we could think of our assembly song as the singing that enables our lungs to breathe and serve outside the womb of the nave. Science comes out with more and more evidence of the health and wholeness benefits of the act of singing - what that kind of breathing, vibrating, and cooperative vibrating with an assembly can do for our body chemistry and even vascular health. How can you help your neighbor in this need? By letting go and singing when we gather. Nothing empowers participation in this increasingly rare public act than doing so with a group - and feeling like if one were to let go and sing, it would not be a solo. The impact and power of expression through this act is a huge gift - to God, to each other, and to the world. (excerpts from *The Olive Branch*, articles by David Cherwien)

A little trivia...if you were to count all the hymns in our hymnal with the word "sing" in it, you would find 194. Twenty-two include "sing" in the title.

In conclusion, Psalm 47:6 sums it up quite nicely:

Sing praises to God, sing praises! Sing praises to our King, sing praises!



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Pieces of Autumn



As we journey through the seasons it appears the shades of summer are quickly coming to a close. Within a short time the echoes of outdoor laughter will be growing faint and become distant. Once crowded beaches will become quiet and still while a chill is in the air. The bleachers will become empty where once a noisy crowd was

chanting. Bats and gloves will again become untouched. Balls no longer glide across the field or fly above the court as fall begins pushing its way in.

Before long the pieces of autumn will begin to ever so gracefully float from their mighty trees toward the ground. In some ways I feel a sense of sadness and loss of all the things given up, stilled and quieted until the signs of spring return. Yet autumn is one of God's most beautiful seasons that I look to with much anticipation. For to me, the Lord puts forth His wondrous paint brush.
